## Nursing informatics news from Belgium from Walter Sermeus

In the international nursing informatics community, Belgium has been known for its unique Belgian Nursing Minimum Dataset (BeNMDS). The dataset dates from 1985 and is still mandatory in all Belgian acute hospitals since 1988. Since 1994, the information derived from this dataset was used to adjust the financing of hospitals according to differences in nursing intensity. In 2008, the dataset was revised (BeNMDS 2.0) with more items (N=78) and was based on the Nursing Intervention Classification (NIC). The dataset became fully integrated in the hospital discharge dataset. Out of the BeNMDS, Nursing Related Groups (NRGs) were derived that were used for the financing of hospitals. In 2019 a new refined NRG model is developed. The report can be found in Dutch and French on the website of the Belgian Federal Ministry of Health [1].

In 2008 the EU-funded RN4CAST project (led by KU Leuven, Belgium and U. Pennsylvania, USA) was launched to describe nurse staffing, qualification and working environment in hospitals. The study was involving 12 European countries and three non-EU countries. The results are extensively reported in the literature. The study ended in 2011, but the data collection continued in Portugal, Cyprus, Italy and recently Slovenia. In some countries, the study was repeated to measure trends. Also in Belgium, the study was replicated in 2019, led by the Belgian Health Care Knowledge Centre. In 2019 more than 5200 nurses from 82% of the acute Belgian hospitals participated in the study. Comparing 2019 with the original study results in 2009 shows a small improvement in patient-to-nurse ratios (from 1:10.8 to 1:9), 8 percent point increase in the number of bachelor trained nurses (55% to 63%) and a slight improvement in the work environment of nurses (mainly in leadership support and nurse-physician relationships). But overall, we see also more missed care, higher burn-out and more job dissatisfaction. The full report (in English) can be found on the KCE Website[2]. In 2021, two new studies were commissioned to KCE to investigate nurse staffing levels on intensive care units [3] and nursing homes [4]. Both studies are still ongoing.

In 2020, the EU-funded Magnet4Europe project (led by KU Leuven Belgium and University of Pennsylvania), started involving 67 hospitals in six European countries (including 14 Belgian hospitals). The project aims to implement a Magnet-based intervention to improve hospital nurses' and physicians' mental health. More information can be found on the Magnet4Europe website [5].
